I hope that you will find the handbook informative and that it serves a purpose to assist all of our students as they work their way to becoming productive members of our community within the Canadian fabric.





Terms and Conditions

The terms and conditions listed below are based on an agreement between Mi'kmaw Kina'matnewey. representing the Mi'kmaw postsecondary students of Nova Scotia First Nations, and Mrs. Caroline Marshall-Hobbs, wife of the late Grand Chief Donald Marshall, Mi'kmaw Grand Council

- 1. The objective of the Donald Marshall Sr. Memorial Scholarship Fund is to support Mi'kmaw postsecondary students at the diploma, certificate, bachelor and graduate level in their field of study.
- 2. The Donald Marshall Sr. Memorial Scholarship Fund will contribute two annual scholarships for one thousand dollars (\$1,000) each on or before October 1 (Treaty Day) of each calendar year. One for undergraduate studies and one for graduate studies.
- 3. Must be a registered Mi'kmaq from Nova Scotia First Nations or be on the Nova Scotia General Band Registry
- 4. Must be a graduate or be continuing in their field of study.
- 5. Must submit an official transcript of marks from institution.
- 6. Application deadline August 29th, Annually

Who is eligible to apply to FAAY?

All Canadian Aboriginal students (status, non-status, Metis and Inuit) who are studying full time in a high school, college, university or technecial institution in Canada are eligible to apply for funding from FAAY.

NS Power Aboriginal Scholarship

Created in 1994, the Employment Equity Scholarship offers four \$1500 entrance scholarships to graduating high school students who are: disabled persons; persons of visible minorities; or Aboriginal Persons.

The scholarships are tenable at any institution offering post-secondary education. The scholarships are renewable for a maximum of your years of study (depending on the length of study) leading to a certificate, diploma or degree.

Criteria:

Recipients are selected based on academic achievement, community involvement, involvement in extracurricular activities and personal attributes. Applicants must be graduating from a Nova Scotia high school and entering their first year of post-secondary education within 15 months of their high school graduation.

Eligibility:

Applicants must be either disabled persons, persons of visible minority(*), or Aboriginal persons.

 Applicants must be Canadian or landed immigrants, and a permanent resident of Nova Scotia for at least three years, two years of which are immediately prior to high school graduation.

 Applicants must be graduating or have graduated from Nova Scotia high school and entering their first year of post-secondary education within 15 months of their high school graduation.

Deadline: March 30, annually

- Your Plan of Study: In more or less 500 words, tell us about your educational goals and career plans. Be sure to talk about any community, family or school initiatives you may be involved in as well as personal challenges, and the importance of the CN Scholarship
- Applicable proof of eligibility
- Aboriginal status see accepted documents

Proof of heritage includes any of the following: copy of Indian status card: copy of Métis membership card: copy of Inuit beneficiary card: parent/grandparent heritage information and official document(s) showing your relationship to them (long-form birth certificate and/or baptismal records); letter of acknowledgement from First Nation, Métis association or Inuit agreement administrator. When sending in long form birth certificate, please send in the long-form birth certificate that indicates the parent name that will reflect the parent name on the accompanying status card/Métis card/Inuit agreement.


